

Volunteer Spotlight

CAROLEE VON SHILLAGH

FYOU'VE JOINED US for a 2PM Walk & Talk lately, you may have had the pleasure of hearing volunteer Carolee von Shillagh discuss life in the old West—the *really* old West, that is, where giant sloths and mammoths roamed the land that would become Oregon. A science enthusiast and retired educator, Carolee's is a familiar face in the *Explore Oregon* exhibit hall, where she inspires visitors of all ages to delve into Oregon's fossil record.

Carolee's got a thing or two to say about the not-so-old West, as well. Inspired by the exhibit Blake Little: Photographs from the Gay Rodeo, she recently developed a fascinating 2PM Walk & Talk titled "I See by Your Outfit." The talk examines the form and function of Western

outfits, comparing Hollywood images with the looks of real, working cowhands.

"I end the talk with a twist," she said, "telling visitors about famous cowgirls and women heroes of the old West. It's really fun."

As a longtime gay and lesbian rights advocate, Carolee saw a special opportunity in the Blake Little exhibit, which opened at the museum last fall and explores the intersections of Western heritage and gay culture. "The exhibit is a way for people who see things in black and white to see a little more in shades of grey," she said.

She may not be decked out in Western wear, but we think Carolee is the real hero of this story. Since



2014, she has logged over 1,000 hours of volunteer service at the museum, bringing her love of learning and remarkable people skills to her frequent shifts—whether in the exhibit halls, the collections vaults, or at family and community events.


